Please do follow and let us know if you do any of the activities. They include TV programmes and films to watch, mathematical art and origami, as well as maths games, websites and puzzles. If your child is old enough (13 and over) you could suggest they follow us too. The suggestions are not extra work, just some ideas to help pass the time in a mathematical way!
- All Years: Your child is likely to be spending more time online or on social media at the moment. On the website is our new online safety newsletter with help and advice for parents on how to keep them safe in different forums, including the new Call of Duty Warfare game and family friendly changes to TikTok. - Drama live Theatre productions: Seeing good quality live productions or recordings of theatre performances is an important part of our Drama courses in all years. As well as being culturally enriching, students learn how to read meaning into performance as well as how to describe and evaluate elements of design. Many theatre makers have now made productions available online and we would like to take as much advantage of these as possible. The National Theatre put a production online every Thursday which is available for a week. BBC iPlayer also have productions available to watch in their Arts category. A virtual trip to the theatre might be something you would enjoy doing together as a family.
- Years 7 & 8: The students have seen recordings of *Romeo and Juliet* and *Peter Pan* from the National Theatre, that we will make available for students to re-watch online as revision. We will also use Show My Homework to inform students of other age-appropriate productions that they might enjoy.
- Year 9 & 10: Students taking the GCSE and A-Level courses are required by the exam board to see as much Live Theatre as possible. Until theatres are open again and we can take them to see something live, we would like them to access

productions online. The first production we will be setting work on via Show My Homework is *Wise Children* on iPlayer. The play is based on the novel by Angela Carter and although a riot of song, dance and comedy, it also explores some adult themes that are not appropriate for younger children. The GCSE and A-level students we took to Bristol Old Vic to see it live thoroughly enjoyed it and it provided lots of good material for study, so we are confident that although challenging, it is entirely age-appropriate for our students. We would recommend that students do not watch the play in the presence of younger siblings under the age of 14. As adults, you might enjoy watching the play with your child so you can support them with their analysis and evaluation of the features of the play.
