MISUSE OF SUBSTANCES POLICY

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Status:	Recommended

1. PURPOSE

- 1.1. This policy gives clear guidance to staff, governors, parents and pupils on the school's view of drugs, cigarettes (including e-cigarettes) and substance misuse education. It sets out how substance misuse related incidents are managed and the rules relating to controlled substances in school.
- 1.2. Drugs play a part in the lives of everyone and experimentation with drugs has always been a feature of many young people's lives. Education has an important role to play to help reduce the harm from drugs, in drug prevention and in helping those who misuse drugs. This policy emphasises the school's pastoral and proactive role to drug education. In developing the policy the school has considered its legal responsibility, the needs of pupils, teachers, governors, parents and the local community.

2. RELATIONSHIP TO OTHER POLICIES

- 2.1. This policy should be read in conjunction with other relevant documents, including the Personal, Social, Health and Citizenship Education (**PSHCE**) scheme of learning.
- 2.2. Other documents that are directly or indirectly relevant to this policy are the school's Behaviour Policy, Confidentiality Policy, Safeguarding Children Policy, Medical Conditions Policy, Data Protection Policy, Trips and Visits Policy and Sex and Relationships Policy.

3. SCOPE, PRINCIPLES AND DEFINITIONS

- 3.1. Drugs A definition: Drugs are substances which alter the mind or body. This policy is concerned with:
 - 3.1.1. legal drugs such as alcohol, solvents and tobacco (including e-cigarettes or 'vapes');
 - 3.1.2. other new psychoactive substances (so called 'legal highs') along with illegal drugs, for example ecstasy and cannabis; and.
 - 3.1.3. the misuse of prescribed and over the counter medicines.

Any reference in this policy to "drugs" is a reference to the above. This policy is not concerned with the legal and appropriate use of prescribed and over the counter medication.

3.2. The use of drugs on school premises:

3.2.1. The school is committed to promoting the health and safety of students and therefore the drugs covered by this policy, as well as drug related paraphernalia, are prohibited and must not be not brought to, sold, passed on, used or obtained on the school premises. Any breach of this prohibition will result in punishment, which may include permanent exclusion.

3.2.2. If a pupil needs to take prescribed or over the counter medication during the school day this is covered by the school's Medical Conditions policy.

3.3. The use of drugs off school premises:

3.3.1. This policy also applies to pupils outside school on any organised or school related activity, travelling to or from school, at any time when a pupil is wearing school uniform or in some other way identifiable as a pupil at the school. Further reference to this is covered in the school's Behaviour Policy.

4. DRUG EDUCATION

- 4.1. The school provides a drug education programme for all students as part of PSHCE and through the Science curriculum. A structured programme of drug education aims to reduce the harm from drugs by:
 - 4.1.1 providing accurate information about different drug use and related issues;
 - 4.1.2 Increasing understanding about drugs and why people take drugs;
 - 4.1.3 helping students to build their self-esteem and confidence and develop skills to cope in situations where drugs are available;
 - 4.1.4 providing opportunities for pupils to explore their own and other people's attitudes helping pupils toward drugs and drug users; and
 - 4.1.5 make informed decisions about the use of drugs.
 - 4.2 Pupils will be informed of this policy in the course of their PSHCE.

5. CONFIDENTIALITY

- 5.1. Pupils may need to talk in confidence to a member of staff about a drug related problem. The welfare of pupils is always the school's highest priority. However, teachers will not be able to promise confidentiality because of legal and child protection issues. Reporting and recording information about a pupil in relation to drugs will follow the same procedures as apply to other sensitive information. Certain key people, including Tutor, Head of Year, Key Stage Coordinator and members of the Senior Leadership Team will have information shared with them.
- 5.2. If exclusion is sanctioned then there may be involvement of a member of the governing board.
- 5.3. All incidents are recorded and kept confidentially. At all times the sharing of such information will be in accordance with the school's obligations under the Data Protection Act 1998 and the school's Data Protection Policy.

6. **RESPONDING TO DRUG-RELATED INCIDENTS**

- 6.1. The Staff Behaviour and Attendance handbook details guidance and advice on how staff should approach incidents involving drugs.
- 6.2. In every situation where there are reasonable grounds for the school to consider that there has been a breach of this policy the following principles will apply:
 - 6.2.1. The pupil will be approached and any drug or drug related paraphernalia will be confiscated.
 - 6.2.2. A member of staff has the right to search and confiscate any prohibited items should they feel it is necessary (see guidance in the school's Behaviour Policy.)
 - 6.2.3. The senior member of staff on duty will be informed and students present will be questioned.
 - 6.2.4. The involvement of the Designated Safeguarding Lead will be considered.
 - 6.2.5. Responses may include both a disciplinary and counselling approach.
 - 6.3. Involvement of Parents:
 - 6.3.1. Parents and carers will always be contacted if their child is in the possession of drugs or associated drug related paraphernalia in breach of this policy.
 - 6.3.2. The pastoral team will work with parents and carers to explore appropriate counselling or guidance from local drug support agencies or charities.
 - 6.3.3. The school recognises the important part parents and carers play in educating their children about drugs. Parents and carers can have access to the drug education curriculum on request and have an opportunity to raise any concerns.
 - 6.4. Police Involvement:
 - 6.4.1. In most cases any sanction related to breach of the rules laid down in this policy is likely to be a school and not a police matter. Under the Misuse of Drugs Act 1971 it is an offence to possess or supply illegal drugs; however the act allows individuals to take possession of an illegal drug in order to prevent someone else committing an offence, providing they either hand it to the police or destroy it immediately.
 - 6.4.2. The school has strong links with the community police and it is the general practise of the school to hand any illegal drug to the police, in line with the school's Behaviour Policy.

7. SANCTIONS

7.1. Any breach of the school rules on drugs will result in a sanction in accordance with the school's Behaviour Policy. The school uses a variety of sanctions, for example including loss of free time, detention, community service, and fixed exclusions depending on the context,

nature and degree of the breach. Permanent exclusion is the ultimate sanction.

7.2. The school's response to a drug related incident may include both a disciplinary and counselling approach.

8. COUNSELLING

- 8.1. The pupil's welfare is of utmost importance and in all incidents involving drugs, a referral for counselling or support within the school is considered. Pupils who are misusing drugs are encouraged to seek appropriate help at the earliest possible stage, including counselling and other external agencies.
- 8.2. Pupils caught using tobacco will be seen by the school nurse.

9. CONSULTATION

- 9.1. In drafting this policy the school took account of the provisions of the 'Misuse of Drugs' Act 1971 and the 'DfE and ACPO Drug advice for schools' (2012) document.
- 9.2. There was consultation regarding this policy between the Senior Leadership and Pastoral teams.
- 9.3. The policy was reviewed, approved and ratified by the Policy Committee of the school governing board.

10. MONITORING, REPORTING AND EVALUATION

- 10.1. The member of the Senior Leadership Team responsible for pastoral systems has responsibility for monitoring the school's adherence to this policy; consulting with the school's Designated Safeguarding Lead and Leader for PSHCE where necessary.
- 10.2. This policy will be reviewed every 3 years.
