PALESTRINA AT 500 Cirencester Parish Church, 7–8:15pm

'The Prince of Music' by Candlelight with The Sixteen Choir. £15-£40



The Sixteen is one of the world's most renowned choral ensembles. For one night only, travel back half a millennium as they perform, a cappella and by real candlelight, in Cirencester's majestic twelfth-century wool church to celebrate the 500th birthday of great Renaissance composer Giovanni Pierluigi da Palestrina (1525-94). Described by Giuseppe Verdi as 'the real king of sacred music', Palestrina developed a famously ethereal and polyphonic (many voiced) sound, written for the Vatican's Sistine Chapel where musical instruments were prohibited. The programme explores some of his extensive output and his influence on those who learnt from him including Allegri, Felice Anerio, Asprillio Pacelli, Josquin des Prez and three trailblazing female composers of the time: Maddalena Casulana, Rafaela Aleotti and Caterina Asandra. Medieval Saints and Old Songs. £12



Join bestselling author Amy Jeffs for a journey through medieval and early modern England as she shares tales from her two most recent books, Saints and Old Songs. Drawing on medieval saints' legends (with severed heads that speak and geese that rise from the dead), as well as early modern folk ballads with their themes of witchcraft and fairy, Amy examines a worldview that shared our seasons and our skies but interpreted them in wondrous ways. From the end of Rome to the Protestant Reformation, discover how saints and songs provide a window into our forebears' imaginations and how they weathered the storms of change. 

The Princes in the Tower: How History's Greatest Cold Case Was Solved. £12



The Winstone Talk: Putin & the Return of History: How the Kremlin Rekindled the Cold War. £12



Putin's invasion of Ukraine, Trump's second term and current conflicts in the Middle East mark one of the most challenging periods in Europe's history since WW2. After the collapse of Soviet Communism, the West convinced itself that liberal democracy would be the dominant system of governance. However the rise of Vladimir Putin shows that it's often unwise to make such predictions. Former BBC correspondent and leading historian Martin Sixsmith traces the historical forces shaping Putin's politics, explores Russia's influence on current global conflicts and reveals how the Kremlin is rekindling the Cold War.

Also includes a pop-up exhibition and community 'listening project' from those who remember the station in its heyday; plus virtual reality experience of the Victorian station developed for the festival by Rixon Architects with Cirencester College design students. THE LOST COLONY OF ROANOKE The Barn Theatre, 12–1pm

In 1587, a group of 117 English colonists, commissioned by Sir Walter Raleigh, landed on the island of Roanoke in North Carolina, earning the distinction of becoming North America's first permanent English settlement and home to the first English child born in the New World. But three years later a relief ship found the colony mysteriously abandoned, leaving behind only the word CROATOAN carved on a palisade – and one of the most enduring mysteries in American history. Were they massacred? Taken captive? Or did they assimilate with a local Native American tribe? In 2025, nearly half a millennium later, and after a decade-long excavation, archaeologist and BBC Coast regular Mark Horton finally unearthed the evidence that may have cracked the riddle once and for all...

THE SECRETS OF DOLLAR STREET HOUSE Corinium Museum, 1-2pm

Restoring an Architectural Gem with Charles Mullineux. £12



30-32 Dollar Street, formerly known as Dollar Street House, was developed by lawyer Joseph Pitt (known locally for his work at Pittville Spa in Cheltenham) in 1725 as two splendid private residences. Its more recent history has been a common one for Cirencester's once-grand mansions: conversion into offices, with boardrooms replacing bedrooms and gardens making way for cars. Latterly, near dereliction left it on Historic England's national register of heritage at risk. Cheltenhambased architect **Charles Mullineux** reveals what it took to rescue one of Cirencester's most important historic buildings and restore it to its former glory, from original balustrades to Regency roof lanterns. Everyone knows that Cirencester was an important Roman city and that the medieval town was dominated by an abbey. But how did the Roman city end and medieval town start, and what came in between? Cirencester is mentioned in Saxon and Welsh documents in the so-called Dark Ages but what exactly did they say? In an extended illustrated talk. Cotswold Archaeology's Neil Holbrook and Simon Draper of Victoria County History (VCH) examine how a once great city failed, ultimately to be replaced by something quite different, and what we can say about the bit in between. Includes brand new research from the VCH's ten-year project on Cirencester and surrounding parishes, due for publication in 2026.

THE MYSTERY OF THE COTSWOLD 'SPATHA' SWORDS Corinium Museum, 12–1pm Glenn Manning and Simon James. £12 (& discounted museum entry to see the swords).



In March 2023, homicide investigator Glenn Manning was at a detectorist rally in Willersey, North Cotswolds, when he recorded a strong signal on his machine. What he initially thought to be a ring pull turned out to be one of the biggest and most significant detectorist finds ever unearthed in the Cotswolds: two exceptionally rare and richly decorated Roman swords, commonly known as spathae, along with remnants of their wooden scabbards and fitments. Subsequent excavations suggest the swords were buried at a grand Roman villa built on the site of an iron age settlement. HistoryExtra's Dave Musgrove interviews Glenn, alongside archaeologist Simon James, to get the full story – just as the restored swords go on display at the Corinium Museum.
