All years - Lockdown Drill: In all schools, it is now common practice to put in place the necessary preparations for an eventuality that might require a 'lockdown'. This means signalling a special alarm and keeping students and staff indoors, quiet and away from a potential source of danger - for example in the unlikely event of a potentially dangerous intruder on site. We have been briefing students today on what the signal sounds like, and what actions they should take if they hear it (Year 9 will receive their briefing on Monday). We will be running a 'drill' to rehearse this soon. If they ask any questions, please reassure your child that this is a routine procedure, designed to help keep our school community as safe as possible. Thank you, Mark Surowiec, Headteacher

All years - Remembrance (from Mrs Wells): I have had the pleasure of leading assemblies this week to commemorate Remembrance Day. We have thought about Remembrance Day as a time for reflection. Time to reflect on the horrors of war and to honour those who gave their lives. I shared an interview my son had held with my Mum where she talked about her experiences of being evacuated as a child during World War II.

We have also thought about the importance of Remembrance Day as a time to learn lessons from the past, to build peace and ensure such horrors do not happen again. We looked at two statues . One in Northern Ireland called 'Hands' across the Divide' which was built as a symbol of peace and reconciliation after the troubles. The other statue is in Hiroshima which is a tribute to a girl who died aged 12 from radiation sickness as a result of the nuclear bomb dropped at the end of the war. The words on the statue are: "This is our cry. This is our prayer: To create peace in the world."

I was very impressed at how beautifully our students listened during the assembly. As a school we will be holding a two-minute silence at 11am on Tuesday 11th. Our History Department will also be giving some readings to commemorate Remembrance Day in the Library at lunchtime. If your child has a link to the Forces (e.g. a cadet) they are invited to wear their uniform on Tuesday 11th. Thank you to our Year 13 Heads of School who will be laying a wreath and representing Farmor's at the service in Fairford on Sunday.
