

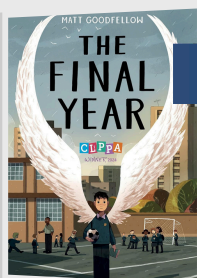
Year 6 into 7 Reading List

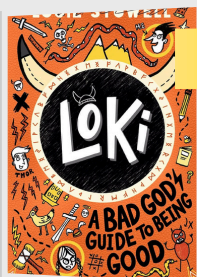
Go Big

by Matthew Burton. This secondary school survival guide will help you to achieve, succeed and be the best you can be at secondary school.



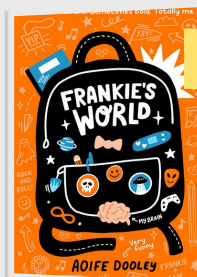
A Kind of Spark

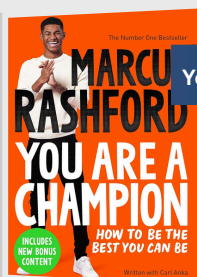
Loki

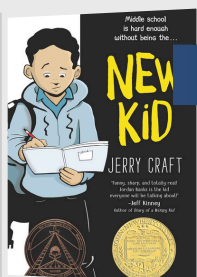
Frankie's World

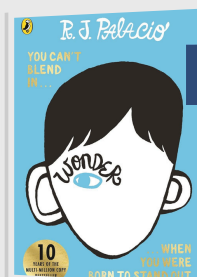
You are a champion

by Marcus Rashford. Inspiring advice, life lessons and personal experiences, encouraging young readers to build confidence, resilience and achieve their goals despite challenges.



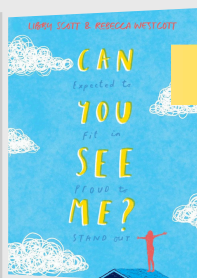
New Kid

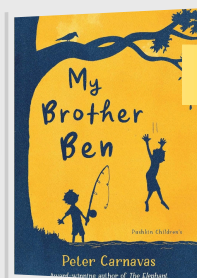
Can you see me

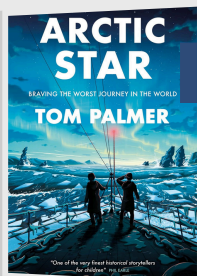
You are awesome

by Matthew Syed. Written by a world champion table tennis player. A funny, self help guide



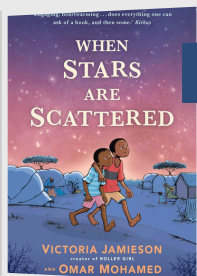
My Brother Ben

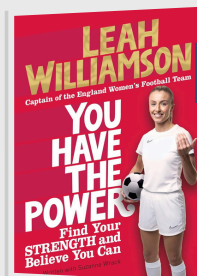
Arctic Star
